

Pastor's Ponderings...

Season of Spiritual Renewal

Bishop Andrew has called us to begin a two-year Season of Spiritual Renewal, lasting until Epiphany 2026. Right across our diocese people are praying for spiritual renewal (revival) to take hold in their own lives, as well as the life of their church, and our diocese. Let's make a daily commitment to spend at least a few minutes in prayer, drawing close to God, who promises to draw close to us and be at work in and through us.

As part of the Season of Renewal, we're coming together as a diocese to worship God at five distinct Eucharistic services throughout the year. Each service will include wonderful music, inspirational preaching, a joyful lay witness talk, and the opportunity for prayer and anointing, followed by a reception that will offer delicious food and plenty of time to reconnect with friends from other parishes. Each service is on a Saturday at 2 p.m. The first service is at St. James Cathedral on March 22 and the second is at Trinity Church, Streetsville on March 29. Let's join our sisters and brothers in the wider Anglican church for worship this year.

Lent

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which is March 5 this year, and it lasts for 40 days (not including Sundays), ending on Saturday in Holy Week, the day before Easter. Essau McCaulley, in his book *Lent: The Season of Repentance and Renewal*, writes, "Lent is inescapably about repenting. Repentance is a change of direction, a Spirit-empowered turning around...about turning away from our sins and toward the living God. A season dedicated to repentance and renewal should not lead us to despair; it should cause us to pray to God for his grace" (p.3).

In the life of the church throughout the past 2,000 plus years, Lent has come "to be about three things: the preparation of new converts for baptism, the reconciliation of those estranged from the church, and a general call for the whole church to repent and renew its commitment to Jesus" (p.8). It's important to say that while there are 3 traditional practices used by our sisters and brothers in the faith to mark the season of Lent - prayer, fasting, and giving to the poor, "we should not see the season of Lent as a series of rules but as a gift of the collected wisdom of the church universal. It is one of many tools of discipleship pointing us toward a closer walk with Jesus" (p.9).

One resource that might be of help in us walking closer with Jesus in Lent this year is called #LiveLent: God's Story, Our Story. It was developed by Dean Stephen Hance (St. James Cathedral) when he was the Evangelism and Discipleship Lead for the Church of England. Starting on Ash Wednesday, it includes a reading from scripture, a short reflection and a prayer for each day during Lent. At the start of each week, there is a brief introduction to set the scene for the whole week, with a weekly action to take. Ash Wednesday & Kingdom Come

I have always found Ash Wednesday to be hauntingly beautiful and I have developed a deep appreciation for the scripture readings and practice of being marked with the burnt ashes of last year's blessed palm crosses that are ground into fine dust and mixed with Holy Oil. It is haunting because in that service as the ashes are marked on our foreheads in the shape of a cross, the words, "remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" are said.

The ashes are a sign and symbol of repentance (turning away from sin and turning toward God instead) that we see used throughout the Old Testament. The reality of the human condition is that we all sin (see Romans 3:23) and we all need God's forgiveness, so with special focus, as a whole worshipping community, at the service on Ash Wednesday we spend time asking God to examine our hearts and show us anything that isn't pleasing to Him. We then confess it and receive God's forgiveness. That is the beauty of Ash Wednesday!

Being reminded of our mortality, as a result of Sin (capital S, as in the Power of Sin) and Death (capital D, as in the Power of Death) is jarring and sobering. It's not everyday we're reminded of the truth and reality of our finite, frail bodies. Thankfully, that's not all we are reminded of with the use of ashes. In the prayer said before we are marked by them, the priest prays,

"Almighty God, from the dust of the earth you have created us. May these ashes be for us a sign of our mortality and penitence,


and a reminder that only by your gracious gift are we given eternal life; through Jesus Christ our Saviour. Amen."

The ashes and those jarring, sobering words are also a reminder that it is through God's gracious gift of His Son, Jesus Christ, and through his birth, life, death, resurrection, and ascension that He HAS defeated the Powers of Sin and Death and we HAVE been given eternal life. So, while our bodies will, one-day, die and return to the earth, that is not the end! There is life-eternal with Jesus!

This year we will have **one service on Ash Wednesday, March 5 at 10am**. In the evening we have again been invited by Bishop Jenny to take part in the next **city-wide service of worship and prayer for revival in Toronto, Kingdom Come**. A small group of us participated in the first Kingdom Come service in November where we gathered with 600+ people from many churches in Toronto. It was glorious! In recognition that historically, revival follows times of repentance, the next service has been planned for **Ash Wednesday at 7pm at St. Paul's Bloor Street**. CCSJ will be a partner church for this event, as will many others across the city.

I want to invite you all to attend that service with me. God is at work in unseen and important ways as His church comes together across denominations with the purpose of repenting, worshipping, and praying together. Will you join me? We will arrange to carpool for those who do not want to drive at night in the winter or for those with mobility issues, others who are able can also easily take the subway. My heart is filled with anticipation and such hope for a move of God's Spirit in each of us and in this city. Let it be, Lord, and may we not miss what you are doing!





<u>"Don't Just Stand There: Pray Something!"</u>

I've a hunch most parishioners would agree that prayer is important? Right?

Now if those same parishioners were asked 'just HOW important is it', what might the response look like? Somewhat? It depends? Occasionally? Often? Lots?

Bottom line: Just as we need to eat, to exercise, or even to sleep, we need to pray. Some would struggle to imagine entering each day without first checking in with Jesus. Why? Because without Him, they are aware of just taking up space. Our best efforts miss the mark, miserably. We aren't meant to go through life without prayer, any more than we are to go through life without food or drink.

But how? How can we make this mysterious thing called prayer less of a mystery and more of a treasured reality in our 'day to day' life? I'm glad you asked. \odot

Here's a quick stab at an answer:

1) Start with "good morning"

Prayer is not supposed to be complicated, any more than it is complicated to chat with any friend or family member. The church over the years may have given the impression that prayer is for 'the experts' and has overcomplicated the topic. Yet you and I know that prayer is for the youngest and the oldest of us. "Good Morning, Jesus" is a super way to begin every day.

2) Prioritize prayer

"But I'm so busy!" Really? So busy you skip breakfast and lunch every day? So busy you have zero time to catch the sports highlights from last night? So busy you've no time to shower? Charles Spurgeon asked a gent who said he was too busy "I've noticed you weren't too busy to put on your



pants before heading out to work today. How long does it take to greet our Lord and to offer yourself and your day to him?"

Personal note: when our kids were little, life was nuts as they prepared for school each day. So we did a daily "P.O.W." together in the car, - we Prayed On the Way to school. We can do the same on the way to work, can't we, be it in the car or on the bus. We can carve out time in our schedules and set it as a priority appointment. One friend of mine has his phone alarm set for a certain time each morning for this very purpose. For some of this, it will be first thing each day, while for others, it may well be just before your head hits that pillow. Point: when we pray isn't the huge deal. What matters is THAT we pray. Right?

We make time for the things we consider a priority. Jesus is worth it. Right?

3) Remember Jesus actually enjoys (and waits for) our company

None of this is meant to be complicated. When those first disciples walked the road with Jesus, they were free to chat with him every step of the way. Likewise for you and me.

A real simple outline (if it helps) is simply to **P.R.A.Y**:

- -Praise (just take a moment to thank God for Who He is...if reading a psalm or a favorite hymn helps, go for it).
- -Reflect (or just come clean with God. Just be honest about any struggles, shortcomings, failures...He's all about forgiveness so let Him. Why let anything pull you down when He wants to lift you up?).
- -Ask (I'd suggest for others, initially. Who is on your heart and mind? Why not literally write those names down and tuck them away in your bible as a reminder to pray each day until there's a breakthrough?).
- -Yield (this is when prayer gets real personal....commit your day to him, your life to him. Bring all your concerns, worries, headaches, fears, issues...He's not called the God of all hope for nothing).

4) Don't make room for discouragement

Keep at it! We may go through times where our prayers seem vibrant and other times where it's a struggle. Giving up is a very real possibility, for all kinds of reasons. Yet Jesus knows all this. That's why he said "always pray and do *not* lose heart". (Luke 18:1).

Where do we go from here? I'd suggest taking a look at our calendars and putting a fence around some time to pray each day.

(Another personal note: when my dad was pushing 100, he told me "If you call me between 8 and 9pm and I don't answer, do not worry. I'm not dead. That is my hour each night with Jesus").

Every relationship requires Time, Trust and Talk. If we're serious about our relationship with Jesus, let's go for it. Sound good?

"The church that isn't praying is straying". Let's keep in step, together.



I believe in the Holy Spirit who is able to guide my life so that I may know God's will; and I am prepared to allow him to guide and control my life.


I believe in God's law that I should love the Lord my God with all my heart and with all my soul, and with all my mind and with all my strength; and my neighbour as myself.

There are a lot of books on prayer for children of all ages Tales That Tell The Truth is a favourite series of mine.



of their lives.


Our Father is a board book illustrating the Lord's Prayer in a way that relates to a child's daily experiences.









normal people and how to hear God: a simple guide for normal people

Whole Prayer: Speaking and listening to God, was very helpful to me when I read it years ago. Arranged under four sections


1. We Speak 2. God Listens 3. God Speak. 4.We Listen this format suggests a helpful flow for us to consider in our personal prayer.








The Practice of the Presence of God


by <u>Brother Lawrence</u> is a classic from the 1600's that is well worth reading to learn how to learn to live with God's presence constantly through out your daily tasks.

This last section focuses on several writers from previous generations who have a lot to offer our generation. The Christians in our past have much to teach us.


From the 1700's **How to Pray: The Best of John Wesley on Prayer** has short excerpts from Wesley's writings matched with a scripture verse and a prayer.

With Christ in the school of Prayer: Prayer and devotional Library has 31 short lessons that one can pick and choose to read any topic as an introduction to this author.


The Ministry of Intercessory Prayer is "the only book he ever wrote with a built-in thirty-day study course in the practice of intercession." (from back cover)




Next from 1963 <u>C.S.Lewis</u> Prayer: Letters to Malcolm was his last book and has enduring wisdom written as it is, as a series of letters on Prayer to a nephew Malcolm.

Finally from 1978, more recent times, but looking back some centuries with certain quotes is **Someone** who Beckons: Readings and Prayers for 60 days author "The Venerable Timothy Dudley-Smith, the archdeacon of Norwich, presents 60 brief meditations, each of which includes a passage of scripture and an

apt and striking quotation from an author such as C. S. Lewis, G. K. Chesterton, John Bunyan, or T. S. Eliot. He concludes each with a terse, poetic prayer which he asks us to make our own, "Slowly and deliberately, in the sight of God"" (from the back Cover)







I could easily go on but I hope that this gives some option of books to consider. These will be on display in the library as well as others. Additional books on Lent will be on display in a few weeks but many of these could continue to become a Lenten read as well.


