

Pastor's Ponderings

As I reflect on my first 2.5 months with you as your new Incumbent and Pastor, I am deeply grateful. It has been a very full time with lots of meetings and getting to know the various ministries at CCSJ and all of you, which has been wonderful! Our time together on Sundays and Thursdays as a worshipping community is encouraging and I am giving thanks to God for all who have visited and those who call this place their spiritual home. It is a great joy to look out at the congregation and see such a beautifully diverse group of people committed to being together, supporting one another, and learning the ways of Jesus.

As I look ahead to the season of Advent and Christmas, I am excited. Advent is the start of a new church year and unlike the world around us, in the life of the church we don't jump right into the "merriment of Christmas"*, rather we embrace the holy season of Advent with yearning as we wait and pray for Christ to come. That's where the season gets its name: Advent means 'coming' or 'arrival'. It's that time where we prepare ourselves and look forward to the coming/arrival of Christ.

We do, of course, believe that Christ has already come, that's what we read about each week in the Gospels. We believe that when Jesus came to earth He brought the kingdom of God near to all of us. We believe that He has already died on the cross and defeated Death and Sin thereby giving us eternal life. Also, we believe that we have already been given the Holy Spirit to be with us. So what exactly are we waiting for?!?

I'm so glad you asked! As followers of Jesus, we believe in not just one coming of Christ, but actually there are three: Jesus coming to us in the Incarnation (God born as a human to live among us); there is also the coming of Christ in the present through the scriptures we read and the sacraments (primarily Baptism and The Lord's Supper) we receive every time we meet together; then there is the coming of Christ at the last days (as we confess in the creed each week). It is "a deeply paradoxical season"*: Christ has come to us, Christ does come to us, and Christ will come again to us.

Advent is beautiful in that as we enter the season, it is always in the dark and as we move through the season and closer to Jesus' birth, the light increases. We see this happen physically each week as we light one more candle on the Advent wreath on Sundays. We begin Advent with our sisters and brothers in the Old Testament as they faithfully waited in the dark for the Messiah (Jesus) to come.

We know already when Christ will come on Christmas, but in Advent we enter into the high drama of scripture where for those people (Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Rahab, Moses, Mirian, Isaiah, Ruth, etc) it was dark and they had been waiting and yearning for the light, the Messiah, to come for years. We reenact that with them as we wait for Jesus' birth throughout the season. Thankfully, we don't have to wait as long as them!

As we get ready for the celebration of Jesus' birth (the Incarnation), we often get so caught up in the festive

celebrations before Christmas that we fail to remember what it was actually like in the time before His birth. By singing songs like "O Come, O Come

Emmanuel" and other Advent hymns we enter into that time with our sisters and brothers and we leave the hustle, bustle and consumerism of the world around us. In that song and many others we hear of the darkness in the world before Jesus came, as well as the longing and yearning for the Light of God to come and to save us all!

Advent gives us an opportunity to both look back and to look ahead. We say it often in our liturgy on Sundays, "Christ has died. Christ has risen. Christ will come again." In fact, throughout church history it is Christ's coming at the last days that has been the primary focus of the season. Throughout Advent we join with the whole church in waiting and yearning for Christ to come and make all things new. You'll notice that our readings on Sundays will focus more on this than on Christ's coming birth in a manger.


We are looking ahead to Jesus coming again and this time not as a weak and vulnerable babe, but as our powerful, conquering, and reigning King who will rule with justice and mercy. When He does come again, death and sin, pain and tears will be no more: injustice will cease and all things will be made right. The themes (hope, peace, joy, and love) that we focus on as we light the candles in the Advent wreath, will all come in their fullness when Christ

returns. It is then that "all of our longings will meet their end."* This is what we look forward to in Advent, the end. What a good day that will be!

So at the beginning of the church year, we look ahead, with longing, for the end to come. In the beautiful, holy, and paradoxical season of Advent our sense of time collapses: we join with those in the past in waiting for Christ to come, we meet together in the present for Christ to come to us in the scriptures and through the sacraments, and we look to the future for Christ to come again. I look forward to marking Advent with you all and to joyously celebrating Christ's Incarnation during Christmas.

*The thoughts on Advent that I've shared with you have been heavily influenced by a great, short book that I recommend to you all. Slow and Costly in a World of Fast and Cheap

First, the algorithms took over.

Some algorithms are beneficial. I enjoy seeing Amazon's recommendations based on the purchases I've made. Sometimes I discover new accounts I want to follow. The algorithms are a serendipity machine, sometimes allowing me to discover things I wouldn't have on my own.

However, we have lost something valuable within the algorithms. We're not seeing what we've chosen to see. We're seeing what social media wants us to see, and it's not always beneficial.

Now, A.I. is taking over. Again, A.I. has its uses. It's easier now to create new words, images, videos, books, and sermons that are well-written but lack depth and emotion. I'm worried about a world in which A.I. and algorithms are in control, and we're reduced to passive consumers.

There's a solution.

People are seeking things that are rare and valuable right now. In a world of cheap and fast, people desire slow and well-crafted."

Pastor: aim to preach a well-crafted sermon. Bring a manuscript to the pulpit that's been stained with tears. Plead with God for your people. Love those God has called you to serve. Labor inefficiently for your people and for the good work God has given you to do. Go for long walks without headphones and pray through the issues that your church faces. Refuse to take shortcuts so you can become a workman who doesn't need to be ashamed of his work (2 Timothy 2:15).

Christians: look for people to love. They don't need more screens. They need faces. Scan those who haven't talked to a soul in days and give them your full attention. Don't look over their shoulders for someone more important. Be all there and care.

Young Christian: cultivate offline habits. Read books. Ask people, not algorithms, for what to read next. Read old books. Strive to be an old soul by staying grounded and not getting caught up in current trends. Think in decades. Work your way slowly through Scripture. Meditate on it. Cultivate the kind of life that will bear fruit for decades. Pray in private where nobody can take notice. Memorize Scripture. Turn off the screens and work out your salvation with fear and trembling. Cultivate a close walk with God.

Writers: write slowly. Refuse to become a content machine. Play at it. Work at it. Enjoy it. Care about it. Learn the craft of writing over time, and surprise us with insights that delight and help. Readers: don't let the algorithm tell you what to read. Learn how to use RSS to follow the best blogs and stop following the rest. Read hard things without A.I. simplifying them for you. Read books, not just posts. Find a few favorite authors and read everything they write.

In a world of fast and cheap, choose slow and costly. You won't see the payoff immediately, but the results, I'm convinced, will be worth it.

One of the greatest attacks of the enemy is to make you busy, to make you hurried, to make you noisy, to make you distracted, to fill the people of God and the Church of God with so much noise and activity that there is no room for prayer. There is no room for being alone with God. There is no room for silence. There is no room for meditation. –Paul Washer

D spoke up, in front of everyone to say "I really needed this tonight. It is no accident that I am here. I have been giving in to sin for quite a while lately. Enough is enough. I really needed this. Thank you all for welcoming me, being so kind to me. I loved all the singing. When I get back to Toronto, I'm definitely coming back here".

Kind of lovely, eh? Another gent also walked in off the street as he peered through the window...also a youngest man. He was just out for a walk, but he was curious. It was neat to have him stay for awhile as we sang, shared, laughed. He was in a time crunch, but even those few moments with him were meaningful ones.



With you I give God praise. We never know who might be drawn inside. As it happened, it was one of our member's 84th birthday (Trudy, from Germany). Her husband Bill made a birthday cake so we had a bit of an unplanned party....a real treat for our visiting friends too. They heard Trudy share her testimony of being born in Nazi Germany, of the bombing in her neighborhood as a child, of her coming to Christ in 1956 through the ministry of Billy Graham in Berlin.

Library Report Advent 2024

Advent begins the church year. It is a period of waiting and watching and preparing ourselves for celebrating the coming of Jesus as a baby into our world. This period reminds us of the period of Lent where we wait and watch as we prepare for the celebration of Easter. In Advent for many of us, this time is also a time to prepare our home with decorations and mementos that remind us of the season of waiting and of the celebration that is to come. One of these might be a <u>Nativity Scene</u> awaiting the Child. This first part of the Walking in the Way from the library looks into the beginnings of this tradition with some lovely children's books.

The poor man of assisi


Did you ever wonder where the tradition of Nativity scenes at Christmas came from? These have now been a part of Christmas preparations for 801 years and was set up for the first time by Saint Francis of Assisi in a cave in Greccio Italy for Christmas 1223. Christians have used Nativity displays of many kinds from a variety of cultures as part of celebrating the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem ever since. We have often displayed Nativity sets or Creches in our church at Christmas time.

Sometimes people have them in their homes at this time of year. Saint Francis apparently actually had live animals, an ox and a donkey, at his nativity scene.

Tomie de Paola, as a young American Artist, dreamed of bringing the story of St. Francis of Assisi to as many people of all ages as possible. Eventually in 1982, for the 800th Anniversary of the birth of St. Francis, Tomie created **FRANCIS**, **the POOR MAN of ASSISI** fulfilling his age -old dream. Using beautiful, simple, colourful illustrations in medieval style, the book is simple enough to be read to young children, but detailed enough to be enjoyed by teens and adults a like.


Saint Francis was born in 1182 to a wealthy Italian couple who lived in Assisi, Umbria. He lived a life of privilege and grew up to be a wild, Irresponsible young man. Eventually, following a serious illness, he felt called to live a simple life of prayer and would have become a hermit, but friends persuaded him that he should sing his songs of the joy of God's love as a preacher. He did this even by preaching to the birds and plants as he considered them to be God's creatures. By the age of 23 he had decided to live a life of poverty, choosing to wear only an old gardener's robe with a cross drawn on the back with chalk. His life became one of prayer, peace and good works. Others joined him to form a brotherhood living a life of poverty close to nature, later becoming The Franciscan Order of the Catholic Church.

Saint Francis of Assisi, is still very much in our world today, with his name on hundreds of churches, schools and universities and through many other ways of commemorating his life. The Prayer of Peace which is attributed to him is familiar to most of us: "...make me an instrument of your peace...". In 1228 he was proclaimed a Saint with his feast day designated October 4. The event of Blessing of the Animals, often held outdoors occurs on this day or close to it. In 1928 he was proclaimed Patron of Italy and in 1980 Pope John Paul II proclaimed Francis Patron of Ecology.




We have several beautiful books about St. Francis of Assisi for children by Author Tomie de Paola and

some for adults to help you learn more about his love for animals, singing Praise to God and some of the legends about this well known Catholic Saint.




In The Song of Francis published in 2009, we have another tribute by Tomie de Paola to Saint Francis of Assisi (for ages 2-7). It is full of vibrant, bold, hot colours and spills over with the joy of knowing God's love. It is a book of jubilation full of brilliant birds and flowers. The book is mostly contemporary Illustrations with limited text. It truly celebrates the joy of life.

Do you know the story of how the lovely Mexican wildflower, the poinsettia, became a Christmas flower for thousands of people in other faraway lands? The Legend of the Poinsettia is a little book with vibrant colours and lovely illustrations introduces you to Lucinda and her story. Poinsettias often become part of our Advent preparations today




We have 2 more Childrens's books from Tomie de Paola centered around Christmas legends and Carols. Also there's a third from another author Lara Hawthorne. These books lead us on to the end of Advent—the Christmas season



JOY to the WORLD by Tomie de Paola. Meet the characters in three familiar Christmas stories illustrated in the lovely drawings and living colours created by Tomie de Paola in JOY to the WORLD. Come to our library to meet Sister Angie, The Three Wise Kings and Lucinda and hear their stories unfold just for you. Your whole family will enjoy this book.

CHRISTINA'S CAROL was Tomie de Paola's last book. He imagines the famous poet, Christina Rossetti, writing her poem that became "In the Bleak Midwinter", a favourite Christmas carol for many people. The art work is splendid with vivid colours and fascinating characters in medieval clothing. The nativity scene has a sweet donkey and quiet sheep along with the amazed shepherds and the stately royal wisemen.



Do you know what the most famous Christmas carol in the world is? Do you know what a little mouse had to do with its beginnings? Drop by the library and check out Silent Night, a book by Lara Hawthorne. Her colourful illustrations bring this much-loved carol to life. See the quaking shepherds and the star-filled night sky. Join the animals and the birds at the manger. You can re-live the Christmas story in a special way and find out about a mouse and a famous Christmas carol.








The Advent Jesse Tree by Dean Lambert Smith

Come Lord Jesus: Devotions for the Home, Advent, Christmas, Epiphany by Susan Briehl





It also includes Advent reflection and discussion starters for each session; 25 'taste-a-day' family activities; ideas for a gingerbread themed family service and 'choose and use' ideas for adapting the material for use in other settings.








who is in there with me and that when I need it, I am given courage I never knew I had. (from the online review)
